In her speech she further submitted that NUS as an institution were also lacking in addressing these issue of inequality for years and calls for an immediate action in these regard. The keynote speakers for me was one of my high point. Linda Bellos OBE, seek to inspire us to take pride in who we are and our heritage. To step up and be counted and never sit on the sideline watching, in other words get involve, be it issues of now or the future . Her message was the we must see ourselves as equals, and take active approach in promoting equality in all we do. Following the keynote talk, Dr Singh and Dr Kwhali both senior lecturers from Coventry university, presented their papers titled "How can we make not break black and minority ethnic leaders in higher education?" I brought a copy of these paper for the union to keep. The report exposed the almost non-existent of equality and diversity in the leadership of our

universities and especially in senior management in higher education institutions .The findings of these paper is so damaging that its call for a swift drive to address this inequality .equality and diversity should be high on every agenda and policies of all universities and higher institutions. The report also recommended 18 ways institutions can implement or improve equality and diversity.

There were four different workshop stations setup and run throughout the day but one could only attend three out of the four. The workshops were on ;

1How to successfully mobilise Black student in election.

2Conflict resilience.

3Understanding and developing your leader identity.

4 Advancing your career in the student movement.

I attended the first three workshops, they were very interesting and properly delivered. The one I enjoyed the most was that of leadership identity.

There were ample breaks between sessions, with hot and cold refreshment readily available, and the lunch break was great, as we were treated to buffet style of a very large varieties of appropriate hot and cold food. It was difficult to stay awake after lunch.

The concluding part of the meeting was yet another interactive session, where we had a five person panel from senior SU members including; head of policy, CEO and deputy CEO. The plenary was on increasing and supporting Black leadership in the student movement.
